

# Today is known as Low Sunday

Also known as 'Pascha Clausum', signifying the close of the Easter Octave, or 'Quasimodo Sunday', from the Introit at Mass – "Quasi mode gentil infantes, rationabile, sine dole lac concupiscite", which words are used by the church with special reference to the newly Baptized neophytes, as well as in general allusion to man's renovation through the Resurrection. So not, as its name suggests, a time to be low or gloomy, we rejoice in the Risen Lord continuously and constantly knowing that we are saved, we are truly an Easter People.



# A Reflection upon Today's Gospel

"Because you have seen me Thomas, you believe. Happy are those who have not seen yet still believe"

St Paul wrote to the Christians in Corinth "if Christ is not risen from the dead, our faith is in vain, and we are amongst the most deceived of men" The central truth of Christianity is that Jesus of Nazareth has conquered death and that all who believe in

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Hím will also conquer death. No other religion teaches the resurrection of the body to immortal life.

Faith is not a blind act, it is a reasonable act based upon evidence:-an empty tomb; a corpse never found; the witness of many who testified, some with their lives, that they had seen, spoken to and touched Him.

"Doubt no longer but believe" the evidence is there for all who have an open mind and heart,
"happy are those who have not seen and yet believe"

If we cease to believe and trust in someone then that person can no longer help us, if we do not trust our doctor and ignore his diagnosis or advice, then we render him powerless to help us. Jesus respects our freedom, just as we can say "no" to our doctor, we can say "no" to Him, to His deeds, "no" to His teaching, to His resurrection, but then He cannot help us.

Help us to do what exactly? He empowers us to carry all our crosses and turn them into Easters, to bring victory out of tragedy and our final cross – death, into resurrection.

Our faith in the resurrection of Jesus is not just a belief that it happened, but a belief in its POWER to TRANSFORM our lives from fear to courage, to know that whatever life throws at us we can overcome.

The disciples had the doors bolted and the windows shut for fear of the Jews, they knew they would be next for questioning and possible crucifixion, the hopes they had in Jesus were now shattered. Fear destroys confidence. But Jesus breaks through all barriers, He came and stood amongst them, "Shalom" he greeting, "peace be with you", the disciples were filled with joy at seeing the Lord, something powerful and extraordinary had happened to change frightened men into bold messengers of the news that death had been defeated, good would prevail, evil will not have the last word.

Christianity is not about suffering, penance, and the cross full stop, but about the cross defeated, suffering conquered and life restored.

Suffering often leads to self-pity and loss of faith, the resurrection empowered the apostles to cure the sick, feed the hungry, to work for justice and peace in society.

The resurrection of the body shows us that heaven is not a matter of merely saving our souls, but Heaven is the transformation of this material world into the kingdom of God, a fit place for God's children to live. We are not angels, we are not expected to live like angels, we are human, bodily creatures for all eternity, through our bodies we relate to each other and to the whole of society. We must have faith in the power of Jesus Risen and Present.

When we say "Christ is Risen" we are also saying "Christ is Present" time and space do not limit the Risen Body, time and space are realities for this world only. The Risen Body

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is a new creation, the doors and windows were bolted shut and yet He came and stood amongst them, the Risen Jesus is really present to the whole of creation.

Today He handed on to His disciples the power to forgive sins with the words "Receive the Holy Spirit, those whose sins you forgive are forgiven" we receive God's forgiveness in the Sacrament of Penance and Reconciliation, the greatest words of absolution were pronounced by Jesus Christ on the cross when He turned to the good thief and said "Today you will be with Me in paradise"

The Risen Christ will astonish us with His power if we take the leap of faith and become His disciples, not only in word but in deed, He will empower us to bear witness to His truth, it is the greatest truth in the world, it ennobles us and gives life its true meaning.
