

# Today is the 6<sup>th</sup> Sunday of Easter

### Readings for today are: -

First Reading	Acts 8:5-8.14-17

"If you love me you will keep my commandments"

We are taught that there are ten commandments, a relatively few number of rules which we are asked to keep and live by. If we look at each one very carefully, we can in fact sum all ten up into one simple active word 'LOVE'. If we love Jesus we will want to do as He has taught us and shown us throughout His life on earth, we will love others as He has loved us.

Jesus lived His life in humility, joy, peace, compassion and love, He served all those with whom He came into contact, He never judged or condemned but accepted and loved everyone as they were, warts and all, He gently, in true service and humility, led people to follow Him. When we live our lives in the same way we are keeping His commandments.

There has probably never been a time in most of our lives when we have been so anxious to follow the rules, no other time when we have followed instructions so carefully and trusted people we have never met to do the same. As a nation we are putting our faith into our political and scientific leaders. Strangely there are some similarities between the guidance Jesus gave His disciples and the rules we are now being asked to follow during this pandemic. Although the delivery of these rules is vastly different, not being given in humility or joy, their purpose is the same, that we would live safely, happily and in good health. That we co-operate with each other to ensure that all people are given the best chance to live life in the best way possible. We are asked to take care of the most

vulnerable, to offer help to those in need and to humbly accept the help of those who offer it if we curselves are in need. Lesus taught His followers to live in the best way possible during difficult times, His commandments are not there to restrict us but rather to set us free, these days we feel uncomfortable with the term 'command', we want to be free to choose and don't relish obeying anyone, but Jesus is not commanding us in the way a ship's captain commands his sailors, He is asking us, gently, to follow His way of life rather than follow a specific set of rules. We are being asked to listen to His words, to see the wisdom they hold and to understand the sense in following Him. We don't keep God's commandments 30 THATHe will love us, but BECAUSE He loves us, His primary instruction to the apostles as He propares to leave them, is that they should love one another as He has loved them, and that love is unconditional. We are to replicate His love on our journey through life, and in doing so we will find that this commandment is not a restrictive burden but a freedom, when we Sove we feel happy and we want to share that happiness with everyone we meet, Sove and happiness are contagious, through living our lives as Jesus taught us love and happiness, therefore peace, humility and joy will spread like wildfire or Tovid-19!! God loves us not because WE are good, but because HE is good. Our very existence is a sign of God's love, our response is to try to return that love, not directly to God, but to the image of God, our fellow human beings, this can be difficult but we are not asked to do it alone, God sent His Holy Spirit to live in us and with us forever and with Him all things are possible. <u>J</u>esus <u>O</u>thers **Y**ourself

## Today is the 5th Sunday after Easter (EF)

"Oh God from Whom all good things come, grant unto us, Thy suppliant people, that by Thine inspiration, we may think what is right, and under Thy guidance perform the same"

The Épistle often contains practical advice for us to live an upright and moral life, it is an aid to encourage us to be faithful to the gifts we receive at the  $\mathcal{M}$  ass and to apply those graces to our daily lives. The first line of this week's Epistle states bluntly "Be doers of the Word and not hearers only, deceiving your own selves", this needs little explanation, we are being compelled to listen to the Word of God, the Gospel and then to put it into practise. It may seem like a tall order and we could become filled with resistance and fear, believing curselves incapable of putting The Word into action, but far from the command being a burden it sets us free. The Gospel reinforces the idea of the joy that comes from following the way of Christ, Jesus says "Ask, and you shall receive; that your joy may be full ". At first glance, we could misunderstand these words to be telling us that we will never want for anything, that we will never have to suffer, just ask for what you want, and you will get it! However, if we are a hearer and doer of the Word, then we will only desire what is conformable to that Word. We will not ask for material riches or comfort in this life, but instead that we might always remain close to the Lord no matter the circumstances of our life. And if we remain close to the Lord, then we cannot help but be joyful!


