

Saint Pius V established this feast in 1573. The purpose was to thank God for the victory of Christians over the Turks at Lepanto—a victory attributed to the praying of the rosary. Clement XI extended the feast to the universal Church in 1716.

October, the month of the ROSARY

The Rosary is widely recognised even today as a Catholic thing. When the media in films or dramas wishes to have a Catholic side to the story a rosary will be in shot at some stage. There is something about the rosary that people like as it is a tangible type of prayers. When in danger or sickness it's good just to be able to hold a set of rosary beads as a reminder of God's presence. A friend of mine studied for a while at an Evangelical Anglican clergy training college. I always remember him saying they'd had a talk by a leading Evangelical preacher who had worked in Africa. He said he envied the Catholics because of the rosary which offered something simple and tangible and a means of praying through the events of the Gospel. My friend must have been impressed as he is now a Catholic.

The origins of the Rosary are lost in time. The tradition is that our Lady appeared to St Dominic and presented him with the rosary as an aid in his struggle with the Cathar heresy in the south of France. Problem is that this account cannot be found before the fifteenth century. Nonetheless the Dominicans take a special responsibility for promoting the rosary to this day. Thus, the order in the Church which prides itself pursuing the intellectual life also has the task of promoting this simplest of devotions which is accessible to children. It is likely that the origins of the rosary lie in the substituting the Our Father and later adding the Hail Mary for the 150 psalms said in the monastic office for those unable to read, such as the lay-brothers of a monastery. Prayer beads are found in most the major religions. Wikipedia offers this information:

The Desert Fathers of the 3rd to 5th centuries, used pebbles or knotted ropes to count prayers, typically the Jesus Prayer ("Lord Jesus Christ, Son of God, have mercy on me, a sinner"). The invention is attributed to Anthony the Great or his associate Pachomius the Great in the 4th century.

The Catholic Encyclopedia mentions strings of beads, presumably for prayer, found in the tombs of Saint Gertrude of Nivelles (7th century) and Saint Norbert and Saint Rosalia (12th century). A more explicit reference is that in 1125 William of Malmesbury mentioned a string of gems that Lady Godiva used to count prayers. These strings of beads were known as "paternosters" and were presumably used to count repetitions of the Lord's Prayer. However, it came to be from the later middle ages the rosary was a feature of Catholic life. The Dominican pope, St Pius V, called on Catholics to pray the rosary for the victory of the Christian navy over the invading Ottoman fleet in October 1571. The Christian victory, despite the odds, at the battle of Lepanto on October 7th was attributed by the pope to Our Lady of Victory, later renamed Our Lady of the Rosary and is he origin of this week's feast.

So, with this boost, the rosary became an important feature of normal Catholic life promoted by many popes. Pope Leo XIII (1883-1898) devoted 12 encyclicals to promoting the rosary. More recently Popes Paul VI and John Paul II wrote encyclicals on the rosary. Some here may have been alive in 1952 when an Irish priest, Fr Peyton, brought his rosary rallies to England. The Catholic Herald of 13th June 1952 reported:

SIXTY-EIGHT THOUSAND tickets have been distributed to Catholics and non-Catholics for Fr. Patrick Peyton's Family Rosary Crusade rally on Sunday at Villa Park, Birmingham, and 40,000 or more other people are expected to gather at an overflow meeting in the public park opposite.

This will be the culmination of a series of rallies which Fr. Peyton is conducting in the Birmingham diocese, the first of which, on Sunday afternoon at Hanley, Stoke-on-Trent, brought about 15,000 people to the old Port Vale football ground.

Coventry had its rally on Wednesday and there will be another big gathering at Oxford tomorrow (Saturday). Twenty-eight thousand parish representatives have been organised to visit every Catholic household to collect Family Rosary pledges.

The response of priests and laity to Fr. Peyton's appeals has already been outstanding. and he himself says he is delighted at it.

"Even if every family said the Family Rosary together only once, all my efforts would be worthwhile," he says. "It would be a wonderful thing if even one night a whole diocese should turn its attention to God."

A different world from today. I doubt you could get 68,000 Catholics together today for a rosary rally. In all 833,500 attended Fr Peyton's rosary rallies in England. His catch phrases were: *The family that prays together stays together* and *A world that prays is a world at peace*. The cause has been going for quite a while for his canonisation.

Mgr Ronnie Knox explained the pull of the rosary as follows:

Partly, I think, because it is pure Gospel, until we get on to the last two, all the mysteries (that is human events charged with divine meaning) follow the Bible from the beginning of Luke to the beginning of Acts. Partly because it corresponds to our natural moods- joy shot with sorrow, sorrow crowned with glory. But most because it is meant for simple minds and it does us no harm, even at the cost of putting force on ourselves, to achieve simplicity. You go back to the nursery, to the ages of faith to find Bethlehem, and Calvary and heaven. So, if you've not felt the pull of the rosary recently that is what October is for. Our Lady made it known at Lourdes and Fatima that we should pray the rosary. This month is a reminder lest we have drifted away to use this great engine of prayer to lift our hearts and souls to Almighty God.

Here at St Joseph's we have been able to provide help through Joe's place, but sadly this has yet to be given permission to reopen. We have also, in the past been able to provide Greggs food vouchers which have enabled many hungry mouths to be fed. Please consider buying a voucher and donating it to our poor via the collection plate on a Sunday.
