The Other Nine, Where Are They?

The one who returned was a Samaritan, a foreigner, not a believer. Perhaps the other nine returned later, Jesus would be waiting for them. The Lord is always waiting. Jesus is the same, "yesterday, today and tomorrow", waiting for us to ask for His healing touch in times of trial and sickness, ready to return to say "Thank you".

In our 1st reading also the one who returned is a foreigner, Naaman, an officer in the Syrian army, an Arab with leprosy. His maidservant suggests he should approach the prophet Elisha for healing from the God of the Hebrews. Elisha tells him to bathe in the river Jordan; he trusts the word of the prophet. In gratitude he builds an altar to the Hebrew God back home in Syria, with soil from Israel.

Luke's Gospel was written for the gentiles, he shows Jesus as the compassionate saviour for all people; to all who trust in Him. God's blessings are not restricted to a chosen people, they are given to those with faith that he is with us in our sickness and in our shattered dreams. We must never lose faith in Him.

Luke was a doctor and he knew that sorrow and sickness were universal.

He mentions a few medical details: how lepers waited for Jesus at the entrance to the village, they were forbidden to enter towns and villages as the disease was so contagious. They lived in isolation in caves far away from social contacts; they wore face masks covering nose and mouth and rang a bell to warn others of their presence. Luke records how "they stood afar off" to avoid infecting Jesus and His companions, they needed to shout "Jesus, Master have pity on us" Finally Jesus tells them to "go and show yourselves to the Priest".

Many preachers interpret "go tell the Priest" to mean for us today to go to confession for a clean bill of health after sin, a spiritual leprosy; and so be restored to God's family table, the Eucharist, this is a very useful interpretation and application.

But, Luke was simply recording the facts of the day; the lepers needed a clean bill of health to be allowed to return home to their communities. The idea of church and state as two distinct authorities did not exist. Israel was one nation under God. A theocracy governed by the High Priest. The Temple or the Synagogue was the local Authority, who would pronounce them cured.

"Where are the other nine? No-one has returned to give thanks except this foreigner"

Thank You is a very lovely word; it makes for friendship and community and love. We often remind forgetful children in their excitement with a birthday present "is there a little word you've forgotten?" it is an important word in any language:- "danker" in German, "Merci" in French, "Gracias" in Spanish, "Gratsi" in Italian, "Dziekuje" in Polish, "Shekran" in Arabic, "Gratias" in Latin and of course in Greek "Eucharisto" (pronounced "Efharisto")

Jesus was the happiest man who ever lived, a happiness born from gratitude to God for all His gifts, "I thank you Father Lord of Heaven and earth for hiding these things from the learned and the clever and revealing them to mere children" His whole life was a continuous THANK-YOU, a EUCHARISTO to God. His last night was a thank you meal with His friends, the night before He was betrayed He gave thanks to God.

Holy Mass is a powerful thank you for God's blessings.

Prayer without action however is dead, we show gratitude by sharing our gifts with others; sharing our time, talents and resources; all are gifts.

May our last prayer at night and our first in the morning be one of thanksgiving.

Equity, Diversity and Inclusion Consultation September 26 2022

This year Bishop Robert and the Board of Trustees commissioned research to provide recommendations on improving Equity, Diversity and Inclusion (EDI) in the Diocese, led by expert consultant Ngozi Lyn Cole.

After a successful first phase of consultancy sessions involving clergy, employees, volunteers and parishioners, phase 2 is planned for October 2022 consisting of **three EDI 'learning and development' sessions** taking place over Zoom, with the theme 'Being the kind of Christians God wants us to be'.

These Zoom sessions will provide a deeper dive into the subjects discussed in the initial consultation sessions, and each session is centred on a different topic, so there is something new to learn from each. They have been scheduled for different times and days of the week to hopefully make at least one session accessible for all.

The sessions are:

- **EDI awareness and language**: Thursday 13 October, 2.00 4.00pm.
 - **Bias**: Thursday 20 October, 6.00 8.00pm.
 - Inclusion: Tuesday 25 October, 3.30 5.30pm.

These sessions will inform the project's final recommendations to the Bishop and Board of Trustees on the approaches that will best work for increasing awareness of EDI across the Diocese, leading to a detailed action plan.
